## Learning Style Cube Game Directions

Included with this game:

- A game cube
- 28 Learning Style Game Cards
- 3 Learning Style Posters
- A Learning Styles Guide Sheet
- A Learning Styles Paper Folding Activity [Blog Post](#)

I've included the foldable from my blog post. It is a good idea to introduce the learning styles and share several strategies students can use from the guide sheet. Students can select the strategies for each learning style they feel they would use and write them behind the flaps in their foldables.

\*Copy the cube, cards and posters onto cardstock. Laminate the cards and posters for durability.

This game can be used for a small group, or several sets can be made for classroom use with 3-4 players.

How to Play:

- Each player should receive six cards. The extra cards should begin a deck in the middle. Students may look at their cards but shouldn't show them to the other players.
- After deciding the order of play, each player will roll the cube. The player will reveal a card from their hand that is a strategy for the learning style rolled on the cube. If correct, the card will go to the bottom of the deck. If incorrect, the student must keep the card and draw another card from the top of the deck.
- The game is over when one player gets rid of all of his or her cards first.

# Learning Style Guide

Visual learners should:

- Use flash cards.
- Highlight important details.
- Sit near the person speaking.
- Use or draw pictures or charts.
- Use colors to organize.
- Write down important information.
- Work in a quiet place.
- Use post-its for reminders.
- Use checklists.
- Work alone.

Kinesthetic learners should:

- Use the computer.
- Use movement or motions to remember
- Take short breaks.
- Make flash cards.
- Make a model or display.
- Act or role play what you've learned.
- Work/Study in a comfortable place or position.
- Take notes.
- Walk around while studying.

Auditory learners should:

- Listen to books on tape.
- Create a rap.
- Read aloud when possible.
- Talk about what you've learned.
- Study with a friend or group.
- Participate in class discussions.
- Ask questions
- Create a song.
- Record important information.




